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This is something I heard recently in a conversation with an acquaintance.

A reversal in society has already begun.

The annual income of programmers working at IT companies is being overtaken by that of workers in civil engineering and construction sites. Just look at the job marketâ??itâ??s obvious. Programmer job postings attract a flood of applications, while construction and civil engineering jobs receive far too few applications compared to the number of openings.

What will happen as AI continues to spread?

The judgment of â??itâ??s faster and cheaper to use AI than to hire new graduatesâ?• will become increasingly common, and the doors to employment will narrow further.

A future is just around the corner where children who study hard and graduate from university cannot find jobs.

What I want to question here is our attitude as adults.

Even in the face of this reality, many adults think only of their own lives and fail to feel a genuine sense of crisis about the future of children and young people. Even when I talk about this, the reaction is weak.

Is that really okay?

The advance of immigration policy, the closing of options for education and employmentâ??all of these may ultimately be the result of our generationâ??s indifference as parents.

Even if you think â??my child will be fine,â?• you cannot escape the changes of society as a whole.

Past generations even had the resolve to risk their lives for the future.

But what about us today?

Are we so absorbed in hobbies and money that we turn our backs on the next generation?

It is our children who will live in the society to come.

Will we pretend not to see the future that leaves them frozen in place, or will we reach out a hand?

The answer must be given by usâ??the parent generation living today.
